West New Bern Parkway -

It was meaningful for New Bern to be a part of our name and our main roadway

Bayard Wootten Lane -

Creator of the Pepsi logo and pioneer North Carolina female photographer known for being a daredevil to get "the photo"

Bradham Boulevard -

Caleb Bradham, founded Pepsi in New Bern

Chiles Drive -

Bob Chiles, Consulting Engineer for Weyerhaeuser and City of New Bern for many years (deceased)

Clock Road -

A tribute to the historic, beautiful clock tower of the New Bern City Hall Building

Downey Drive -

Taylor Downey, Weyerhaeuser North Carolina Operations Manager for over 30 years

Ella Bengel Drive -

Named for the first and only elected woman Mayor of New Bern

Gerock Place -

Samuel Gerock served as captain in Continental Army in the Revolutionary War; New Bern business leader buried in Cedar Grove Cemetery (tombstone lost and new one dedicated in 2019)

Hap Barden Way -

New Bern teacher, Craven County judge and U.S. Congressman; prominent figure in helping secure the openings of area military bases

James Davis Drive -

Named for the first newspaper and book printer in North Carolina (in New Bern)

Kellie Court -

Kellie Hawkins Kiser, former longtime Weyerhaeuser Project Manager for West New Bern

Kilberg Lane -

Jim Kilberg, retired Weyerhaeuser Senior VP of Real Estate, Energy and Natural Resources; was the visionary behind the recent planning of the community

Mayhew Drive -

Carolyn Durand Mayhew, New Bern's first librarian

Minnette Circle -

Minnette Chapman Duffy, who organized the first meeting of the New Bern Historical Society in 1923; she helped convert the John Wright Stanly House into a public library and led fundraising efforts to restore Tryon Palace

Montford Drive -

Donum Montford, a liberated slave who helped free others; an African-American artisan of plastering and bricklaying whose work can be found all around New Bern

Spivey Circle -

Washington Spivey, Craven County African-American Postmaster (1888-1908)
