West New Bern Significant Roadways

To pay homage to the area's history, the majority of West New Bern's roadways are named for significant individuals to New Bern, Craven County and Weyerhaeuser.

West New Bern Parkway -

It was meaningful for New Bern to be a part of our name and our main roadway

Bavard Wootten Lane -

Creator of the Pepsi logo and pioneer North Carolina female photographer known for being a daredevil to get "the photo"

Bradham Boulevard -

Caleb Bradham, founded Pepsi in New Bern

Chiles Drive -

Bob Chiles, Consulting Engineer for Weyerhaeuser and City of New Bern for many vears (deceased)

Clock Road -

A tribute to the historic, beautiful clock tower of the New Bern City Hall Building

Conderman Drive -

Robert Conderman served in the Marine Fighting Squadron, and his death marked the first WWII casualty from New Bern; Purple Heart Recipient buried in the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific

Downey Drive -

Taylor Downey, Weyerhaeuser North Carolina Operations Manager for over 30 years

Ella Bengel Drive -

Named for the first and only elected female Mayor of New Bern

Samuel Gerock served as captain in Continental Army in the Revolutionary War; New Bern business leader buried in Cedar Grove Cemetery (tombstone lost and new one dedicated in 2019)

Gilbert Waters Place -

New Bern entrepreneur who built the first Buggymobile in the horseless carriage market and was the first North Carolinian to use a steam-powered engine

Hap Barden Way -

New Bern teacher, Craven County judge and U.S. Congressman; prominent figure in helping secure the openings of area military bases

Henry Willis Place -

Henry Willis Wetherington was the original land purchaser for North Carolina Pulp Company; acquired smaller timber parcels in eastern NC during the 1930-50s, which then became Weverhaeuser tracts

Jim Kilberg, retired Weyerhaeuser Senior VP of Real Estate, Energy and Natural Resources; was the visionary behind the recent planning of the community

Mayhew Drive -

Carolyn Durand Mayhew, New Bern's first librarian

Minnette Circle -


Minnette Chapman Duffy, who organized the first meeting of the New Bern Historical Society in 1923; she helped convert the John Wright Stanly House into a public library and led fundraising efforts to restore Tryon Palace

Mollie Heath Drive -

First-grade teacher born in 1866 who taught for 43 years; beloved by her students and the community so much a cedar tree was planted in her honor and still stands in New Bern

Donum Montford, a liberated slave who helped free others: an African-American artisan of plastering and bricklaying whose work can be found all around New Bern

Washington Spivey, Craven County African-American Postmaster (1888-1908)
